

The Uxbridge Music Hall

In 1865, Uxbridge was a rapidly growing pioneer community, in need of a central place where citizens could come together to socialize, enjoy entertainment and discuss business. On the site of the current Music Hall on Main Street, the Ontario Hall was erected and stood for almost 30 years as the cultural centre of the town, before being claimed by fire in 1893. Eight years later, plans were well underway for a new hall and the establishment of a local Musical Society. By 901 the corner stones for the current Music Hall were laid and by year's end the official opening took place.

Even amid early plans to tear down this stunning specimen of local heritage, extensive renovations throughout its history have preserved and enhanced the Music Hall's glory and grandeur. The original opera chairs are still in the balcony, which is encircled by a beautiful carved iron railing. The original cut glass chandelier still hangs from the ceiling and beautiful wooden floors grace the stage, main floor and balcony.

Known for its superior acoustics, the Music Hall has hosted a wide and varied range of musical, theatrical and dance events. Owned by the Township of Uxbridge, the Music Hall has also been the site of many private functions.
